## Process for CR's to receive Continuing Education Credit for Written Articles 7-9-2019

This process was developed to allow current consulting rosarians to obtain credit towards their required four hours of continuing education (CE) by having a written article published in <u>any</u> ARS affiliated society newsletter.

## 1. The basis of this process is:

- A. A consulting rosarian (CR) shall receive 1 hr of continuing education (CE) credit for an article published in at least three (3) local society newsletters.
- B. This process shall be limited to two (2) articles during a four year period between the CR's last seminar/school and next Audit due date.
- C. If the CR attends a seminar/school before their next Audit due date, a new 4-year period starts at the date of attendance of that seminar/school. Only articles written during the new 4-year period qualify for credit during the new period.
- D. Each article shall be reviewed and approved by the district committee <u>prior to publication</u> to ensure articles are useful to the reader and worthy of CE credit.
- E. Once the home district approves an article, any ARS affiliated society newsletter qualifies for the credit. (e.g., an article written by an NCNH District rosarian published in a Gulf District local society newsletter may show some differences with the other District's culture, but the overall article has value to rosarians in other Districts). The NCNH District committee decides if there is significant value in an article to warrant the 1 hr CE credit.

## 2. The Process

- A. The CR shall submit their article to the District CR Chair using the "CR Written Article Credit Request" form (on the District website or by request from the District CR Chair).
- B. All correspondence between the submitting CR and the District CR Chair and Committee SHALL be via email. Paper articles and snail mail printed articles are unacceptable. (Articles must be submitted as Word, WordPerfect or Adobe PDFs.
- C. The District CR Chair shall distribute the article to the district committee for approval within 14 days of receipt.
- D. District Committee members shall Review & Approve/Decline the article and return it to the District CR Chair within 14 days of receipt.
- E. The District CR Chair shall notify the CR of Approval/Declination within 5 days of receipt from the District Committee. An Article is "Approved" if it has received approval by a simple majority of the district committee, including the District CR Chair.
- F. It is the responsibility of the CR to contact newsletter editors to have their article published <u>after</u> the district committee has approved it.
- G. Local society editors are NOT REQUIRED to publish any article in their newsletter.

- H. It is the responsibility of the CR to notify the District CR Chair of the publication of the article in the required three (3) newsletters by sending email links to the society newsletters or electronic copies of the newsletters to the District CR Chair.
- I. The District CR Chair shall award approval of the one (1) hour CE credit only if the article has received "Approval" from the District Committee & District CR Chair (see 2.D) and receipt of the publication notifications.
- J. The District CR Chair shall maintain a record of the partial credits assigned to the CR.

## 3. Article Requirements:

- A. Approved articles shall have a minimum of 500 words and a maximum of 800 words.
- B. Article subjects shall cover the Core CR topics covered in CR Schools/Seminars or approved alternate topics as listed in the CR Manual.
- C. The Core Topics are:
  - i. Chemical Safety (any "pesticides" articles must stress safety)
  - ii. Soils and Water
  - iii. Fertilizer and Nutrients
  - iv. Insects (Pests)
  - v. Diseases of Roses
- D. Alternate topics, other than the CORE topics covered in a School, that are directly related to roses and rose growing can be considered, as well as an article published in the *American Rose*, the A.R.S. National Magazine, and other quality articles deemed worthy for credit by the committee.
- E. Approved Alternate Topics are listed in the CR manual.
