

## Horticulture Schedule

#### 2023 South Central District Rose Show

Bayou City Roses

Bellaire Civic Center 7008 S. Rice Ave., Bellaire, TX 77401

Hosted by: Houston Rose Society Friday - Saturday, October 27-28, 2023

The grooming area opens at 7:00 a.m. Placement of entries will be from 7:30 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. Exhibitors must place their own challenge class entries. There will be a placement table receiving all other entries. Judging of the show begins at 10:30 a.m.

Trophies may be picked up immediately after the luncheon.

#### **GENERAL RULES**

- 1. **TIME & PLACE:** Entries will be accepted from 7:30 a.m. until 10:00 a.m. Judging begins at 10:30 a.m.
- 2. **ELIGIBLE EXHIBITORS:** This show is open to all amateur rose growers and arrangers who need not be a member of any rose organization, except where noted in special classes.
- 3. ENTRIES: All entries are under control of the show committee and shall not be moved or removed until the show closes. However, the show committee reserves the right to remove any roses. All blooms must have been grown in the exhibitor's own outdoor garden. No more than one exhibitor or team may place blooms from the same garden. More than one specimen of the same variety from the same garden in the same class automatically disqualifies all those entries.
- 4. TAGS: Entries shall preferably be labeled on tags provided by the show committee. The entry tag must contain the rose variety/ies, class number, and the exhibitor's name. The exhibitor's name should be covered at the time of judging. Fully completed tags from top to bottom are preferred, but only the above three criteria are required. In classes requiring more than one specimen in individual vases, a tag should be attached to each item unless they are all the same variety. An example of this would be the classes for Stages of Bloom. Vases for single specimens will be provided by the show committee.
- WEDGES: The use of wedges to better position a specimen rose or a group of roses in a vase is permitted. Wedges of clear plastic, aluminum foil, oasis or Styrofoam are preferred.

- 6. EXHIBITION NAME: All roses must be exhibited under their American Rose Society (ARS) exhibition name or commonly recognized synonyms. A rose variety need not be registered with ARS to be exhibited in this show, but must be listed in one of these ARS publications: (1) Modern Roses or the Modern Roses online database, (2) the Official List of Approved Exhibition Names for Exhibitors and Judges, (3) The Handbook for Selecting Roses or supplements thereof, (4) registration on the ARS website, or (5) in the Combined Rose List. The most recent ARS publication is the final authority. The responsibility for proper identification and classification rests with the exhibitor. Reasonable abbreviations are acceptable, but not desirable.
- 7. **DISCLAIMER OF LIABILITY:** Due care will be given to safe guard exhibits, but neither the South Central District, the American Rose Society nor the Houston Rose Society will be responsible for loss or damage to entries, property or persons.
- 8. **NOVICE EXHIBITORS:** A novice is an otherwise eligible exhibitor who has never won a blue ribbon in an ARS accredited rose show. Participation in this division does not prevent exhibiting in other divisions.
- 9. **JUDGING:** Judging will start promptly at 10:30 a.m. and will be done by ARS Judges in accordance with (1) the *Guidelines for Judging Roses*, (2) the *Guidelines for Judging Rose Arrangements*, and (3) the *Guidelines and Rules for Judging Rose Photography* published by the American Rose Society. Horticultural specimens exhibited will be judged on the following scale:

For the judging of arrangements see Arrangement Rule 12 at Pgs. 16 -17. For the judging of photographic entries see Photography Rule 3 at Pg. 23.

Judges will disqualify any entry which does not comply with ARS rules.

#### Disqualification will result from:

- (1) Foreign substance. Application of a foreign substance to enhance the beauty of the entry.
- (2) Misnamed. The name of the rose is neither the variety name given on the entry tag nor an accepted synonym thereof.

- (3) Unlabeled or Mis-labeled Entry. The entry lacks an entry tag or the exhibitor's name, the class number, and/or the name of the variety is not given on the entry tag.
- (4) Exhibitor's name is visible on the entry tag, if not corrected before the entry is judged.
- (5) An entry that was not grown outdoors.
- (6) An entry that was not grown by the exhibitor.
- (7) Violation of show rules, specifically:
  - a. A challenge class or collection entry that does not satisfy the composition and/or staging requirements of the class in which it is entered.
  - b. An entry in a class with restricted eligibility that the exhibitor is not eligible to enter.
  - c. When expressly prohibited by the show rules, entries made in the name of an absent exhibitor.
  - d. Unless expressly permitted by the show rules, separate entries from the same garden by two or more exhibitors.
  - e. Unless expressly permitted by the show rules, multiple entries of the same variety by the same exhibitor in the same class.
- 10. **DURING JUDGING:** Only clerks, judges and other authorized show committee personnel will be permitted in the show area.
- 11. PLACEMENT: Exhibitors may place their own challenge entries. The exhibitor will have no restriction on the relative placement of the individual specimens, except that some classes may have space limitations. Exhibitors must not move or interfere with other entries when placing their entries. The placement committee will place all other entries. Exhibitors are permitted only one entry per Challenge Class in all Sections.

#### CLASS 3 MODERN ROSE BOUQUET

SEVEN (7) OR MORE HYBRID TEAS, one or more varieties, one bloom per stem, displayed in one container, at exhibition stage. Wedging material is not permitted. Container to be provided by the exhibitor.

THREE (3) SHRUB ROSES, each a different variety, one bloom per stem and/or sprays displayed in separate containers.

THREE (3) HYBRID TEAS OR GRANDIFLORAS, each of the same variety, one bloom per stem, in different stages of bloom, displayed in separate containers. Stages to be one bloom 1/4<sup>th</sup> to 1/3<sup>rd</sup> open, one bloom at exhibition stage and one bloom fully open (stamens must show).

SIX (6) HYBRID TEAS OR GRANDIFLORAS, at exhibition stage, one or more varieties, no foliage to show. English Boxes provided by the show committee.

Blue ribbon winners in each class are eligible for Standard Queen, Miniflora Queen and Miniature Queen of the Show.

## Arrangement Schedule

## SOUTH CENTRAL DISTRICT ROSE SHOW ARRANGEMENT CLASSES

The grooming area opens at 7:00 a.m. Placement of entries will be from 7:30 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. Exhibitors must place their own arrangement class entries. Judging of the show begins at 10:30 a.m.

Trophies, certificates and rosettes may be picked up immediately after the luncheon.

#### ARRANGEMENT RULES

The Arrangement Division is governed by the rules of American Rose Society (ARS) as stated in the current *Guidelines for Judging Rose Arrangements*. By entering this show given under ARS Rules, exhibitors agree to abide by those rules.

- 1. PRE-REGISTRATION: All arrangement entries must be <u>PRE-REGISTERED by Monday</u>, October 16<sup>th</sup> at 10:00 p.m. with Don Johnson or Brenda Johnson by e-mail to twodogsandroses@aol.com.
- **2. TIME & PLACE:** Entries will be accepted from 7:30 a.m. until 10:00 a.m. Judging begins at 10:30 a.m. Entries must be removed after the luncheon.
- 3. **EXHIBITORS:** This show is open to all amateur rose growers and arrangers who need not be a member of any rose organization, except as noted in certain special classes. Only one entry per exhibitor is allowed in each arrangement class, but an exhibitor may enter as many classes as desired. All arrangements must be the work of the exhibitor.
- 4. ENTRIES: All entries are under control of the show committee and shall not be moved or removed until the show closes. A rose or roses must be the dominant flower in all arrangements. Flowers other than roses and dried and/or treated dried plant materials are allowed unless prohibited by this schedule. Accessories are allowed unless otherwise stated in this schedule.
- 5. STANDARD SIZE ARRANGEMENTS: These classes can use any type of rose. The arrangement is not to exceed 24" in width or depth and there is no restriction on height.
- 6. MINIATURE SIZE ARRANEMENTS: These classes are to include Miniflora and/or Miniature rose varieties only. The arrangement is not to exceed 12" in height, width, or depth.

- 7. TAGS: Entries shall preferably be labeled on tags provided by the committee. The entry tag must contain the rose variety/ies, class number and the exhibitor's name. The exhibitor's name should be covered at the time of judging. Fully completed tags from top to bottom are preferred, but only the three above criteria are required. The Style of Arrangement is requested on the entry tag. A card of intent may be included with the arrangement as an explanation of the arranger's interpretation of the theme or class title. "AG" should be written at the top of the entry tag if roses are arranger grown in order for the entry to be eligible for high ARS awards (medal certificates).
- 8. EXHIBITION NAME: All roses must be exhibited under their ARS exhibition names or commonly recognized synonyms. A rose variety need not be registered with ARS to be exhibited in this show, but must be listed in one of these ARS publications: (1) Modern Roses or in the Modern Roses online database, (2) The Official List of Approved Exhibition Names for Exhibitors and Judges, (3) The Handbook for Selecting Roses or supplements thereof, (4) registration on the ARS website, (5) contained in the Combined Rose List. The most recent ARS publication is the final authority. The responsibility for proper identification and classification rests with the exhibitor. Reasonable abbreviations are acceptable, but not desirable.
- 9. PLACEMENT: All arrangements will be placed by the exhibitor in the space assigned to the exhibitor. Backdrops may be furnished by the exhibitor. (Exhibitors must remove the card designating their space after placing the arrangement).
- 10. DISCLAIMER OF LIABILITY: Due care will be given to safe guard exhibits, but neither the South Central District, the American Rose Society nor the Houston Rose Society will be responsible for loss or damage to entries, property, or persons.
- 11. **NOVICE EXHIBITORS:** A novice is an otherwise eligible exhibitor who has never won a blue ribbon in an ARS accredited rose show. Participation in this class does not prevent exhibiting in other classes.
- **12. JUDGING:** Judging will start promptly at 10:30 a.m. and will be done by ARS Arrangement Judges in accordance with the *Guidelines for Judging Rose Arrangements* published by the American Rose Society. Arrangement specimens exhibited will be judged on the following scale:

13. Infringement of the following rules will result in severe penalties.

Painted or dyed fresh plant materials and live creatures are not allowed. The use of plant materials on State or local conservation lists is not permitted. The American flag or flag of any other country may not be used in an arrangement or as a decoration in any way.

14. There are only two causes for disqualification of an arrangement:

Roses not outdoor grown Use of artificial plant material

15. AWARDS: American Rose Society certificate awards will be granted only where merited. ARS certificates may be given to eligible first-place winners scoring 92 points or more. Each class will have only one first place award. Blue ribbon winners in the standard size classes will be consider for large medal certificates and blue-ribbon winners in the miniature / miniflora size classes will be considered for small medal certificates. Trophies and awards must be picked up after the luncheon.

#### "PRESIDENTIAL ROSES"

#### <u>SECTION H: HRS CHALLENGE – PRESIDENTIAL ROSE GARDEN</u>

Class 43: Presidential Rose Garden - A standard size line-mass arrangement using two or more types of roses grown by the exhibitor, properly identified. This class is open ONLY to ARS members.

### SECTION I: SOUTH CENTRAL DISTRICT CHALLENGE CLASSES Classes 44 to 47 Eligible to South Central Members Only

#### Class 44: "Camelot"

A standard traditional arrangement using only fresh plant material. Roses must be arranger grown.

Keeper trophy sponsored by Don & Paula Adlong in honor of Don & Brenda Johnson

#### Class 45: "War Between the States"

A standard modern arrangement. Roses must be arranger grown.

Keeper trophy sponsored by Don & Brenda Johnson in honor of Norma Hedrick Whitehead

#### Class 46: "Gold Rush"

An arrangement using miniature and/or miniflora roses, exhibitor's choice of design (must be stated on tag), not to exceed 10 inches in height, width, or depth. Roses must be arranger grown.

Keeper trophy sponsored by Don & Paula Adlong

#### Class 47: "Watergate"

An arrangement using miniflora roses, exhibitor's choice of design (must be stated on tag), not to exceed 12 inches in height, width, or depth.

Keeper trophy sponsored by Don & Brenda Johnson

#### **SECTION J: STANDARD ROSE ARRANGEMENTS**

that are arranger grown and score at least 92 points are eligible for the ARS Gold, Silver and Bronze Arrangement Certificates. Keeper trophy will be awarded to the best Standard Rose Arrangement.

#### Traditional Eligible for ARS Royalty Award

#### Class 48. "Colonial Williamsburg"

A mass design containing all fresh plant materials.

Class 49: "Seward's Folly"

A line design with other fresh or dried material

## Oriental Eligible for ARS Oriental Rosette

Class 50: "Boston Tea Party" using a medium to tall container. Exhibitors' choice of traditional design (must state type on tag).

## Modern Eligible for ARS Artist's Rosette

Class 51: "Golden Spike". A modern arrangement in exhibitor's choice of design (must state type on tag).

## Princess Eligible for Princess of Arrangements Award

Class 52: "Monticello Gardens". Fresh roses and any other parts of the rose bush only, including, but not limited to, hips, canes (with or without foliage) and roots may be used. No other plant materials or accessories are permitted. Exhibitor's choice of design (must state type on tag).

## Duchess Eligible for Duchess Award

Class 53: "Trail of Tears". A standard design containing fresh roses with dried and/or treated plant material. No other fresh plant materials or accessories are permitted. Exhibitor's choice of design (must state type on tag).

## Duke Eligible for Duke of Arrangement Award

Class 54: "Mount Rushmore". Fresh roses with or without fresh and/or dried plant material. Larger than 10 inches in height, width and depth, but no greater than 20 inches in height, width or depth. No accessories are permitted. Exhibitor's choice of design (must state type on tag).

#### Standard Keepsake Eligible for Keepsake Award

**Class 55:** Standard design with dried roses with or without dried and/or treated rose foliage or dried materials. All materials must be dried material.

### Standard Personal Adornment Eligible for Personal Adornment Certificate

Class 56: A bridal bouquet containing any fresh large rose class (no Miniflora or Miniature roses) with or without fresh and/or dried plant material. Exhibitor's choice of bouquet style.

#### SECTION K: MINIATURE / MINIFLORA ROSE ARRANGEMENTS

that are arranger grown and score at least 92 points are eligible for the ARS Gold, Silver and Bronze Arrangement Certificates. A keeper trophy will be awarded to the best Miniature / Miniflora arrangement.

#### Miniature / Miniflora Designs

Only roses so classified to be used. Not to exceed 10 inches in any direction.

First place arrangements that are arranger grown and score at least 92 points are eligible for the ARS Miniature Gold, Silver and Bronze Arrangement Certificates.

## Traditional Eligible for ARS Mini-Royalty Rosette

Class 57: "New Deal". A mass design with other flowers.

Class 58: "Fireside Chat". A line or line-mass design.

### Oriental Eligible for ARS Mini Oriental Rosette

Class 59: "Omaha Beach". An oriental design in a low container.

## Modern Eligible for ARS Mini-Artists Rosette

Class 60: "Trickle Down". Exhibitor's choice of design (must state type on tag).

### Princess Eligible for ARS Mini-Princess of Arrangement Rosette

Class 61: "Over There". Fresh Miniature or Miniflora roses and any other part of the rose bush only, including but not limited to, hips, canes (with or without foliage) and roots may be used. No other plant material or accessories are permitted. Exhibitor's choice of design (must state type on tag).

## Duchess Eligible for ARS Mini-Duchess Arrangement Rosette

Class 62: "Old Hickory" - Fresh Miniature or Miniflora roses with dried and/or treated plant material. No other fresh plant material or accessories permitted. Exhibitor's choice of design (must state type on tag).

## Miniature Keepsake Eligible for Miniature Keepsake Award

Class 63: Miniature design with dried Miniature / Miniflora Roses with or without dried or treated other plant materials.

#### **SECTION L: NOVICE**

#### Novice Eligible for ARS Novice Certificate

Class 64: "Rough Rider". Open to novice arranger, who has not received an arrangement award in an American Rose Society accredited rose show. Accessories are permitted. Exhibitor's choice of design (must state type on tag).

#### **SECTION M: JUDGE'S ARRANGEMENT**

Open to any Judge Judging this Show Eligible for ARS Judge's Certificate

**Class 65: -** Choose from any class in the arrangement schedule with the design class listed.

## Photography Schedule

#### SECTION N: PHOTOGRAPHY CHALLENGE

The grooming area opens at 7:00 a.m. Placement of entries will be from 7:30 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. There will be a placement table receiving photography entries. Judging of the show begins at 10:30 a.m. Trophies, certificates, and rosettes may be picked up immediately after the luncheon.

#### PHOTOGRAPHY RULES

The Photography Division is governed by the rules of American Rose Society as stated in the current *Guidelines and Rules for Judging Rose Photography*. By entering this show given under ARS Rules, exhibitors agree to abide by those rules.

- 1. PHOTOS: All roses photographed must have been outdoor grown. Photos can either have a vertical or horizontal format. Photos should be printed edge-to-edge without any border. Photographs should be 8" x 10" or 10" x 8" accordingly. Photographs are to be mounted by the exhibitor (using art board or foam core board) and matted using a photography mat that is 11" x 14". All the photos must have been taken by the entrant. Any photo that has previously won a first through fourth place in any ARS National Photography show including the ARS Digital Photo Contest cannot be entered in this show.
- 2. TAGS: Entries shall preferably be labeled on tags provided by the committee. The entry tag should be attached to the bottom right-hand corner of the mounting board. The entry tag must contain the rose variety/ies (unless indicated under individual class specifications), class number, and the exhibitors' name(s). The exhibitor's name should be covered at the time of judging. Fully completed tags from top to bottom are preferred, but only the three above criteria are required. For a photo containing multiple varieties, the predominant varieties should be listed. If the exhibit has been grown by the photographer, then the designation "EG" should be written in the top right corner of the entry tag.
- **3**. **SCORING:** Photographs will be judged according to the *Guidelines & Rules for Judging Rose Photography*:

Composition	15 Points
Technique	15 Points
Distinction	20 Points
Total	100 Points

- 5. AWARDS: American Rose Society photography medal certificate awards will be granted only where merited. ARS Photography Medal certificates will be given to eligible blue-ribbon winners (limited to exhibitor-grown entries). Queen, King, or Princess rosette awards will be awarded amongst all photography classes.
- 6. RIGHTS: All rights to the submitted photographs are retained by the owners of the photographs. However, by submitting a photograph to the contest, the exhibitor (1) warrants that he or she owns the copyright of the submitted photograph and is not legally prohibited from submitting it to the contest, and (2) agrees to allow the Houston Rose Society to display the photo at the rose show and publish the photograph in the print, electronic and social media publications of the Houston Rose Society.

#### CLASS 66 - One Bloom

A color photograph containing one bloom, of any classification.

#### CLASS 67 - One Spray

A color photograph containing two (2) or more blooms, any classification.

#### CLASS 68 - Macro Photography

Photographs should be an extreme close-up photograph of any part of the rose or rose plant. Color, black & white, sepia or combinations of these are permitted in this class.

#### CLASS 69 - Creative Interpretation

The photograph should evoke a sense of originality and a new and different way of imagining the rose or roses with the mind's eye. This may include processes used to alter the original image such as colorizing, texturing, dodging, burning, dithering, painting, shadowing, blurring, layering, cloning, filtering, merging, cropping. Color, black & white, sepia, or combinations of these are permitted in this class. Photo enhancement software is permitted in this class. Rose variety not required for this class.

#### CLASS 70 - Rose Garden

A color photograph of either a public or private rose garden. Photographs should show the use of roses within the structure of a garden, which can be widely variable. Roses should dominate in the photograph, and some layout of the garden should be visible. The name of the rose garden or individual's name **must** be listed in lieu of rose variety on the entry tag.

#### CLASS 71 - Arrangements

A photo of an arrangement, miniature or standard of any style, following the ARS *Guidelines for Judging Rose Arrangements*. Arranger's name **must** be listed in lieu of the rose variety.

#### CLASS 72 - Judge's Class

Choose from any class in the photography schedule with design class listed.



## Root-a-Rose Workshop & Cutting Exchange

Any method used to root cuttings is <u>correct</u> if it works. There are countless ways to root cuttings that range from direct sticking into the garden to starting them in plastic bags and pots. Some methods work better and are more reliable than others.



One of the main keys to success is to start with a rose that is known to root easily. Rose cuttings featured in the Exchange will be ones that have a history of being easy to root.

Robert Trevino is the Program Chair for the Texas Rose Rustlers and is a master propagator of roses and all types of plants. Robert is known for driving to a Rose Rustler event with a vehicle loaded with pots of plants that he has started from cuttings.

Gaye Hammond, Past President of the Houston Rose Society has taught hundreds of people across the country how to root cuttings in plastic bags.

Robert and Gaye will share tips and tricks to make your propagation efforts more successful. At the end of their program attendees may select cuttings to take home and try their hand at rooting cuttings.






